	<p>Skills and Attributes:</p> <p>Students will have to prepare for the classes by reading the relevant parts of the suggested literature and the summaries of the decisions of the Supreme Court of the Republic of Hungary published in the <i>Bírósági Határozatok</i> (available in English). They will have to write a test at the end of the course. They also have to write at least one paper (min. 5 pages) comparing a legal institution or provision of the Hungarian and their own civil procedure.</p>
